<p>Collage is made up of arranged pieces of materials to create an image            Artists such as Henri Matisse and Megan Coyle use collage to create their art.</p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around;">   </div> <p>Paper can be cut, torn, folded, shaped, overlapped and glued to create an image or design.            Collage can be used to create landscape pictures.            Media can be combined to fill shapes and outlines            Patterns and texture on animals can be created by selecting materials for colour and pattern.            Art can be created on a small and large scale            Art can be created individually and in a group</p>	<p><u>Listening/Composing</u>            A composer is a person who writes music. You can use your body to represent movement. For example, you can make your body big or small when a sound is loud or quiet. You can hop and skip to a happy song or glide slowly to a sad song.            You can create your own music with your voice or an instrument to create a pattern. A pattern is a group of notes and rests that repeat.            When creating music, sounds can be changed</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- high and low (pitch)</li> <li>- loud and quiet (volume)</li> <li>- fast and slow (tempo)</li> <li>- short and long (duration)</li> </ul> <p>You can change the pitch, volume, tempo or duration of your voice to copy something that you can hear, like a rainstorm or a train journey.            Camille Saint-Saens was a French composer.            He composed music called The Carnival of the Animals.  <u>Notation</u>            Symbols can be written down to show you when to play and when to rest.            A computer programme can be used to create the sound that an instrument can make.            Music and sounds can be changed on a computer programme.</p>	<p>Some things are living, some are dead, some have never been alive.
